**Redmond's Views.**  
London, Sept. 14.—John Redmond, speaking at Augheim, Wicklow county, Ireland, said the Irish party would find an entirely new situation when parliament next met. The English parties would be broken up and the Irish party would wield a power such as it never before possessed. He counseled a continuance of the policy which had resulted in securing the Irish land bill, which he valued above all as opening the way to obtaining an Irish parliament.

**German-Americans Meet.**  
Baltimore, Md., Sept. 14.—The second triennial convention of the German-American Alliance began here. An address of welcome was delivered by President John T. Jarks of the local branch, which was responded to by President T. J. Sexamer of the national organization. The various committees were appointed.

**Convicts Make Queer Coins.**  
Philadelphia, Sept. 14.—Following closely upon the exposure of gross irregularities in the cigar department of the Eastern state penitentiary came the public announcement that illegal coinage of silver pieces has been carried on by convicts in the big institution. No details of the counterfeiting scheme can be learned from any of the officials connected with the prison or from the government officers that have been assigned to the case.

**Noted Woman Dead.**  
New York, Sept. 14.—Mrs. John M. Sherwood, author and social leader, is dead of heart failure, due to old age. Mary Elizabeth Wilson Sherwood was the daughter of a representative in congress, James Grant Wilson of Keene, N. H., and was married to John M. Sherwood in the early thirties. She was an authority on etiquette, amongst her best known books being "Manners and Social Usages."

**Refuses to Pay Umpires.**  
Port of Spain, Trinidad, Sept. 14.—British government officials, who have returned here from Caracas report that the Venezuelan government has refused up to now to pay its share of the fees of the foreign umpires in the matter of the claims against Venezuela, amounting to \$5,000, and their expenses. The conduct of President Castro in such circumstances is inexplicable. It is understood that several of the foreign umpires have referred the matter to their governments, suggesting that Washington should interfere as being, in their view, morally responsible for the Venezuelan government.

**Father of Senator Simmons Killed.**  
Newbern, N. C., Sept. 14.—Purnford G. Simmons, father of Senator F. M. Simmons, was killed on his plantation a few miles from Pollocksville, Jones county. The body was found near a river bank. Mr. Simmons had been shot several times with a shotgun. Bruises about the head indicated that he was clubbed also. Mr. Simmons was a quiet man, about 75 years old. The cause of the killing is unknown. A negro of the name of Daniels has been arrested as the slayer.

**Woman Next Challenger.**  
New York, Sept. 14.—Mrs. Graeme Hunter, an expert yachtswoman, will be the next challenger for the America's cup. She is the wife of a Scotch-Canadian millionaire. Mrs. Hunter will have a Clyde-built boat, to be designed by Alfred Mylne, whom she considers the peer of Herreshoff as a designer.

**Man Kicked to Death.**  
Norwich, N. Y., Sept. 14.—In a fight at McDonough, Tracy H. Borrows was kicked to death by Frank Gole, whom Borrows had just shot in the neck with a revolver. Borrows had accused Gole of escorting his wife to the Green county fair.

**Conducted a Brewers' School.**  
Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 14.—Dr. Ernst Hantke, aged 40, professor of chemistry and conductor of a brewers' school in this city, died suddenly of pneumonia. He was well known in German circles throughout the country.

**Transport Foundered.**  
London, Sept. 14.—An unconfirmed rumor is current that a transport carrying a British regiment to India foundered in a gale which swept the British coast last Thursday.

**Town Went Dry.**  
Greencup, Ky., Sept. 14.—The town of Springdale, this county, went dry by a vote of 54 to 46.

**Dynamite Lets Go.**  
Bay City, Mich., Sept. 14.—Clarence D. Hopper and Roy Boucher, switchmen of the Michigan Central railway, were instantly killed by an explosion of dynamite in a car in the yards at West Bay City. Robert Robin, engineer; William Noble, fireman, and John Cradle, conductor, were injured, the latter so severely that he may die. All of the trainmen were residents of this city.

**Quick Lunch Man Dead.**  
New York, Sept. 14.—Patrick Dolan, who for more than 35 years conducted a "coffee and cake" restaurant in Park Row, and who was reputed to be the originator of the quick lunch, is dead.
